Barcola v. Interim Healthcare Services, Inc., et al. Plaintiff was on maternity leave and was terminated by her employer. An action was brought pursuant to the Civil Rights Act and the Family Medical Leave Act. After a jury trial on December 6 and 9, 1999, a jury returned a verdict in favor of the Plaintiff indicating that the employer had violated the Family Medical Leave Act. This was the first jury verdict in favor of a Plaintiff in the Middle District of Pennsylvania. I acted as co-counsel for Plaintiff with Attorney Robert D. Mariani, and did approximately fifty (50%) percent of the witness examination along with a significant portion of the drafting of pleadings. The case was before Judge James M. Munley in the United States District Court for the Middle District of Pennsylvania. Attorney Al Nicholls represented all of the Defendants and has an address of 1421 East Drinker Street, Dunmore, PA 18512 and telephone number of 570-344-7171. An Appeal by the Defendants to the Third Circuit was denied. 31 Fed. Appx. 791 (3rd Cir. 2002).

Schott Glass Technologies, Inc. v. UCBR, 832 A.2d 554 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2003). In June, 2002, the United Food and Commercial Workers represented the employees of Schott Glass and were engaged in collective bargaining negotiations. After negotiations did not produce a new collective bargaining agreement, the bargaining unit members engaged in a work stoppage and subsequently applied for unemployment compensation benefits. One employee's application for unemployment compensation benefits went to hearing and was to set precedent for all of the employees engaged in the work stoppage which totaled approximately 450. The Unemployment Compensation Referee granted benefits determining that the work stoppage was a lockout under the Unemployment Compensation Law. The Unemployment Compensation Board of Review affirmed the case and the matter was first heard by a panel of the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania. The Panel then rescheduled argument before the Court En Banc and

argument was set for May 7, 2003. The Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania affirmed the decision of the Unemployment Compensation Board of Review. The case involved litigating on every level starting with the Hearing Examiner and proceeded to the Unemployment Compensation Board of Review, culminating with argument before a Panel of the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania and the Court En Banc. I represented the Claimants before the hearing examiner and Unemployment Compensation Board of Review, and intervened on their behalf before the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania. Attorney Richard M. Goldberg represented Schott Optical during all phases of the litigation. Attorney Goldberg's address is 600 Third Avenue, Kingston, PA 18704 and his phone number is 570-287-3000.

Pennsylvania State Troopers Association v. Col. Jeffrey B. Miller, 621 Fed. Supp. 2^d 246 (M.D. Pa. 2008). An action was brought by the Pennsylvania State Troopers Association and its President against the Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police maintaining that a policy of the State Police violated the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) because it required troopers to disclose the nature of illnesses when requesting sick leave in violation of the ADA. After both parties filed Motions for Summary Judgment, the Court granted the Troopers Association's Motion for Summary Judgment and denied the Commissioner's Motion. Without going to trial on the basis of a Motion for Summary Judgment, we were able to obtain a judgment invalidating a policy under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Judge Christopher C. Connor issued his decision on September 30, 2008. Attorney Michael L. Harvey from the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office handled the matter with an address of 15th Floor, Strawberry Square, Harrisburg, PA 17120, and telephone number of 717-772-4526.

H. Stanley Rebert, York County District Attorney v. York County Detectives Association, 909 A.2d 906 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2006). The County Detectives Association (Union) filed a grievance maintaining that the District Attorney's Office had violated the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Union and the County by scheduling a detective outside the perimeters of the Collective Bargaining Agreement. The grievance was sustained by an Arbitrator and the District Attorney appealed the case to the Court of Common Pleas of York County. After the Court of Common Pleas affirmed the Arbitrator's Award, the Commonwealth Court affirmed the lower court's ruling. The case clarified the standards that are applied in situations where a row officer maintained provisions of a collective bargaining agreement were in violation of Section 1620 of the County Code, 16 P.S. §1620. Attorney Stacey R. MacNeal represented the County and District Attorney H. Stanley Rebert with an address of 345 East Market Street, York, PA 17403, and telephone number of 717-850-3708.

Pennsylvania State Corrections Officers Association v. Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of Corrections. This matter involved an interest arbitration proceeding between the Association and the Commonwealth pursuant to Section 805 of the Public Employee Relations Act, 43 P.S. §1101.805. The interest arbitration proceeding involved setting the terms and conditions of employment for 10,000 plus members of the Association. Hearings were conducted on April 18, 19, 27, 28, 29, May 9, 10, 19 and 20, 2011. I was the lead attorney for a team of attorneys representing the Association. An arbitration panel consisting of Attorney Walter DeTreux, Attorney Alfred DeAngelo and Attorney Sean T. Welby issued a decision on June 29, 2011. The Commonwealth

appealed the arbitration award to the Commonwealth Court. (1360 C.D. 2011). The award was affirmed. A Supplemental Award was also issued by the Panel and an appeal of said award was denied by the Commonwealth Court. 2013 W.L. 3960932 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2012). 
